Web Blogs Defined, Explained and Understood

What are Blogs?

Having heard the term previously but not having paid much attention most people are just too afraid to show their ignorance and ask the question, what is a blog? Lets face it; the term blog does not conjure pleasant images.

Blogs are web logs that are updated regularly, usually on a daily basis. They contain information related to a specific topic. In some cases blogs are used as daily diaries about people’s personal lives, political views, or even as social commentaries. The truth of the matter is that blogs can be shaped into whatever you, the author, want them to be.

Where Did Blogs Come From?

The roots of blogging can be traced back to the mid 1990's. Who the very first blogger actually was is unclear, as the art of blogging did not really take hold until 1999. The original “weblogs” were link-driven sites with personal commentaries. The very first blogs were human guided Internet web tours. While initially thought of as diaries or online journals, blogs have evolved into the latest fresh web content.

The Future of Blogs

A buzz word in techie circles, “blogging” is the wave of the future. Whether it's a fad, or proves to be a new way to communicate with existing and potential customers it deserves at the very least a cursory look.

Why Blogging Is Helpful to Businesses or Individuals

Just as animated .gifs were once cool, blogging is the trendy thing to do. That does not mean that it is not beneficial to businesses. Webmasters struggling to keep fresh, attractive content on their websites to lure visitors back, have found blogs the answer. Content is a necessity for online businesses, both for purposes of being found by search engines but also because it gives visitors a reason to come back.

Now that we have established that blogs are not only trendy but also beneficial to businesses, it’s important to understand how they can be used to your advantage. We currently manage and update two blogs on a daily basis. The first is our new business blog at: www.notepage.net/blog.htm. This professional business blog allows us the opportunity to tell potential—or existing customers—industry news,

Word Processing Tips

WORD — Viewing Special Files

Let's imagine that you have a large number of files in your Word data folder. These files are not all DOC files—some are RTF, some are TXT, etc.

- * Choose File/Open and then click the arrow at the right side of the 'File of type' list box and select 'All Files' (*.*) .
- * Now click Cancel.
- * The next time you choose File/Open, you will see all the files in your data folder.
- * What if you want to see only RTF files right now, but, you don't want to change 'Files of type' each time you need a new file?
- * Choose File/Open and type in the 'File name' entry box '*.rtf'. Now, only the RTF files will appear and you can make your selection.

WORDPERFECT — Using guidelines to change margins (8/9/10/11)

One way to change margin settings is to display the Page Setup dialog box by pressing [Ctrl][F8] or by choosing Format | Margins. You can also change a margin setting by using your mouse. To do so:

- * First display the margin guidelines by choosing View | Guidelines.
- * Next, select (click on) the Margins check box so that a checkmark appears in the check box and click OK.
- * When you do, WordPerfect will display a dotted line to identify your document margins.
- * To adjust a margin for a specific part of your text, highlight that text and then move the mouse over one of the dotted margin lines.
- * When the cursor changes to a double-arrow icon, click and drag the margin to a new location.
- * You'll note that as you move the margin, WordPerfect displays the setting in a shaded box. ❖

updates, or generally how mobile or paging software can be used in specific situations to alleviate problems. The bottom line is we control the content. It's updated daily, which increases the chances that search engines will spider on a regular basis and it helps with page rank because it's been submitted to all the blogging directories. Initially started on a whim we've found it beneficial to report tips, tricks or make visitors aware of new regulations related to the mobile or paging industry. The second blog we manage is at: www.softwaremarketingresource.com/blog.html.

This blog is less formal and contains marketing tips, or promotional advice for software developers or online marketers. We found that we had overflow from our monthly newsletter. Generating a daily blog would require very little effort and would assist us in creating fresh content which our readers told us was of significant interest.

Blogs & Your Business

The bottom line is you need to determine how a blog will benefit your business, determine a schedule, and adhere to it. Let your readers know what to expect and when to expect it. Blogs provide great supplemental content and direct attention to areas of your business that you want to showcase; you direct the content but let your readers guide you.

Creating a Blog

There are numerous online tools that can be used to create a blog. We found that because of security concerns, it would just be best to use a standard html program. In our case we used Dreamweaver and then create daily posts. It's really not much more complicated than typing an email. The content is then sent via FTP to a web server. If you want to test the waters there are online web-based tools that helps you publish to the web instantly. The most popular web-based tool is likely Blogger at www.blogger.com.

Other Advantages to Blogs

While you may initially create a blog for your existing customers, you may find that you can attract new customers by illustrating your expertise in a specific field. There are numerous websites that act as "blog search engines". Be sure to submit your sites to these websites to increase your exposure. This will also help with your page rank and possibly increase the likelihood you will receive decent ranking with Google. You can also create an RSS feed to syndicate blog content and gain additional exposure. ❖

TWEAKS FOR SP2

Scott says that Windows XP is a safe and secure operating system as long as you don't connect to the Internet.

He recommends installing a third party bidirectional firewall such as Zone Alarm and then disabling Windows Firewall. To do this, go to Start | Control Panel | Security Center, then click the Windows Firewall link at the bottom of the dialog box, check Off in the next window, and click OK.

If Windows does not recognize the firewall a security warning icon may appear in the system tray. To disable the firewall security warning in the Security Center, click Recommendations in the Firewall pane, check I have a firewall solution that I'll monitor myself, and click OK. Windows will then switch your firewall status to amber, and stop the firewall warnings in the system tray.

Automatic Updates are a good thing for some users, because you need to install patches as soon as possible. By default the service downloads and installs updates at 3AM, without inquiring into the user's preferences. But if your computer is always asleep or disconnected from the Internet at 3AM, you might never get any updates under the default arrangement. And you might want to inspect the updates that are available for downloading before agreeing to install them on your PC.

To change Automatic Updates' settings, click the System link at the bottom of the Security Center window (or choose Start | Control Panel, and click or double-click the System icon). Select the Automatic Updates tab. To choose a time when you know your PC will be awake and available to download and install updates, select Automatic (recommended), and pick a time from the drop-down list. To have Windows download but not automatically install updates until you can inspect them, select Download updates for me, but let me choose when to install them.

If you use Internet Explorer as your browser, the Pop-Up blocker may be a useful thing, but it can cause problems when you visit sites that use pop-up windows for logging in, completing surveys, displaying videos, or performing other special tasks.

First, to test whether IE's pop-up blocker is responsible, disable it by choosing Tools | Pop-up Blocker | Turn off Pop-up Blocker. If that tactic solves the problem, you can instruct IE not to block pop-ups from that one site.

To do so, first copy the site's address in IE's Address field then choose Tools | Pop-up Blocker | Pop-up Blocker Settings, then press Ctrl-V to paste the address into the 'Address of Web site to allow' field, and click Add. Or you can type addresses directly into the field.

SP2 introduces a related security feature in the Outlook Express email program. To block the tiny invisible images called Web bugs that sites use to identify you online, Outlook Express by default now blocks downloads of any external images referenced in HTML messages. If you receive one of those slick-looking e-mail newsletters, it may not look so slick after you've installed SP2.

To re-enable the display of these image links in e-mail messages, choose Tools | Options | Security, uncheck Block images and other external content in HTML e-mail, and click OK. ❖

Sites to Visit on the 'Net

More than 3,000 of the cars were imported into the U.S. The vehicle featured a rear engine Triumph Herald motor with 43 horsepower and could achieve speeds of 7 mph in the water and 70 mph on land. For the nostalgia-needy, the site with its various links has many pictures of the Amphicar cruising the waterways and the highways.

Another site to take away the February blues is www.robotfrank.com. Did You Know . . .

. . . that in December security researchers uncovered a spoofing flaw in Internet Explorer that could allow a scammer to display a fake Web site with all the attributes of a genuine, secure site, including the URL and the icon indicating SSL security. This affects only Microsoft IE. Anyone using Firefox, Netscape, Opera or Safari web browsers will not be victimized by this scam as those web browsers do not contain the Microsoft bug. If you are making any online purchases, conducting bank-by-mail or any other sensitive transactions, make sure that you use one of the safer web browsers. There is currently no patch for the bug. If you continue to use IE, turn off ActiveX or switch the security level for the “Internet” zone to “high”. The vulnerability is caused by an error in the way the DHTML Edit ActiveX control handles certain inputs. The result is that a malicious site can execute script code in a user’s browser session in the context of any other site.

. . . that CDs and DVDs will soon be obsolete? How many of you know what a 5 ¼ inch floppy is? Did you have programs or files on a 3 ½ inch floppy and then get a new computer that lacks a floppy drive? Soon you will find that new technology will consist of something that will not play your CD/DVDs. Lockheed-Martin and the Harris Corp. are doing battle to design the Electronic Records Archive [ERA]—a system that will store information permanently so it’s retrievable with whatever hardware and software are available at the time. Although this is a future technology, the smart thing to do is keep up with modern storage devices. At first, CDs were thought to last forever. Now we are cautioned that CD life is much shorter than we expected. In fact, exposure to sun can mean disaster to files on a CD. Until the next best thing to sliced bread comes along, why not make sure your files are safe by burning two CDs. Place one out of harm’s way or at another location. And check the information you have on those CDs to make sure it is still viable. It takes such a short time to do and can be so worthwhile. I have all my photos, both digital camera originals and scanned old photos, on CDs, but I also have them backed up on another computer. Do you want to find out the hard way how heartbreaking it can be to lose data? ❖

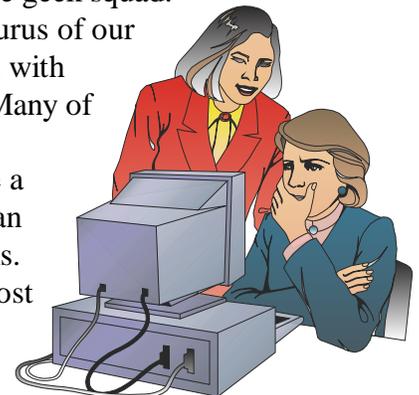
