E-Waste

he computers and electronics that we use everyday contain toxic materials such as lead, mercury, cadmium and other heavy metals. We do not think about what is in them, until they have to be disposed or recycled. Many electronics contain elements—lead, mercury, and cadmium for example—that are safe when the items



are used as directed, but can be hazardous if disposed of in the trash and compacted at landfills. Televisions, computer monitors and other CRT's [cathode ray tubes] contain an average of four pounds of lead and could contain double that amount depending on size and make. Mercury from electronics has been cited as a leading source of mercury in municipal waste. The largest source of cadmium in municipal waste is

rechargeable nickel-cadmium [NiCd] batteries, commonly found in laptops, cell phones and cameras. In an effort to provide many user-friendly environmentally sound disposal and recycling options for the residents and businesses of Oneida and Herkimer Counties, the Authority has developed an Electronic Waste Recycling Program.

David Lupinski, Director of Recycling for the Oneida-Herkimer Solid Waste Authority will present a program on the Authority's Electronics Recycling Program. Mr. Lupinski was appointed the first Recycling Coordinator in Herkimer County in November of 1988 and became the Director of Recycling for the Oneida-Herkimer Solid Waste Authority in 1993. David has an A.A.S degree from the State University of NY, College of Environmental Sciences and Forestry.

In addition to the above program there will also be a surprise showing of . . . well, you'll just have to come and see for yourself!



Microsoft Office 2007 Tips

OFFICE 2007

2003 to 2007 Document Information Panel

When you pause your mouse on your document in Windows Explorer, does it list the author as someone you worked with five years ago? If you started with an existing document, the document property information is probably out of date. With Office 2003 documents, most people don't take the time to rightclick the file in Windows Explorer, click Properties, and then edit the document information. With the Document Information Panel in Office Enterprise 2007 and Office Professional Plus 2007, you can edit document properties directly in the program. Click the Office button, and then click Prepare. Click Properties. The Document Information Panel appears below the Ribbon. Enter the appropriate information and save the document. Keep in mind, search engines like the ones included in Windows Vista and Office SharePoint Server 2007 use document properties to deliver search results that are more relevant. So if you want to make something easier to find, make sure your document properties are up to date.

POWERPOINT

Customize Your Pictures

You can apply style, shadow, and crop effects to the pictures that you add to your presentations. You can create great-looking effects with just a few clicks. On the Insert tab, click the Picture icon to browse for a picture to add to your slide. After selecting your picture, go to the Picture Tools Format tab to see the available formatting options. Pause on the items in the Picture Styles gallery to preview each of the prebuilt options. If you find a style you like, click it to apply the formatting to your picture. If you want to apply custom formatting, select options from the Picture Shape, Picture Border, and Picture Effects galleries.

Save PowerPoint Picture to Picture Files

To save a picture from a PowerPoint 2007 presentation in any popular picture format Right-click the image, click Save as, and then click Picture.

EXCEL

Customize the Appearance of Conditional Formats Such as Data Bars, Color Scales, and Icon Sets

When you need conditional formatting in your Excel 2007 worksheet, try one of the new data visualization options, including color scales, icon sets, and data bars. You can apply these formats with just a click from galleries of preset options, or customize your own conditional formatting rules. To access the new conditional formats, on the Home tab, in the Styles section, click Conditional Formatting, and then point to Data Bars, Color Scales, or Icon Sets. Or to create a custom rule for one of these formats, at the bottom of the Conditional Formatting menu, click New Rule. In the New Formatting Rule dialog box, select the rule type Format all cells based on their values to use the new data visualization tools. In the lower half of the box, you can then choose among data bars, color scales, and icon sets; specify conditions for each formatting type; and customize colors for data bars or color scales.

Note: In Excel 2007, it's also possible to edit existing conditional formatting rules. To access existing rules for editing, at the bottom of the Conditional Formatting menu, click Manage Rules.

WORD

Upgrade Old Documents to 2007 Versions

If you receive a document from a colleague who is not yet running the 2007 Office system, Office 2007 will automatically open it in Compatibility Mode. However, not all the new features will be available to you. When you close the document, it will be saved in its original format. If you want to upgrade the file to the 2007 Office system: Click the Office button, and then click Convert. In the Word dialog box, click OK, and then click Save. **Note:** You may want to make a backup copy of the file before you upgrade it. To see when you are working in Compatibility Mode, look at the top of the screen. The phrase Compatibility Mode will appear in brackets to the right of the file name.

Get your old menus back

Choose Menu Items Carefully

ost of us enjoy seafood. And seafood is good for us because of, among other things, a higher level of Omega-3 fatty acids and lower fat and cholesterol than red meat. But not all fish should wind up on our dinner plates according to some environmental groups.

The Endangered Fish Alliance at endangeredfishalliance.org lists four fish species that should never be eaten because these particular fish suffer from overfishing: Chilean Sea Bass, Swordfish, Orange Roughy and Caviar (Black Sea sturgeon are an endangered specie). Many high end restaurants offer Chilean Sea Bass as well as Blue Fin Tuna, Swordfish and Monkfish, also on the endangered species list.

In fact several months ago, actor Robert Di Nero raised environmentalist ire by serving endangered Blue Fin Tuna at his restaurant chain, *Nobu*. When confronted by activists, the chain manager argued that an asterisk placed next to the menu item alerts diners to the status of the fish.

To find out more about the threat to fish caused by overfishing visit edf.org/seafood and download a pocket-sized PDF file that lists fish species to eat as well as fish species to avoid. The multi-colored pocket Seafood Selector lists best fish choices, ok fish choices and worst fish choices. The EDF encourages consumers to use the guide to select seafood that is good for you and good for the oceans. Bon Appetit.

More Food Choices

Further healthy food choices can be found at www.eatwild.com. This site touts the benefits of grass fed beef, bison, lamb, and chicken. According to the site, these meats are lower in calories, fats and higher in beta-carotene and vitamin C, among other healthy food elements. These foodies contend that grain-fed animals not only contain more bad fats and more calories than grass-fed animals, but feed lot animals also contain antibiotics and growth hormones that may hurt you in the long run.

Many sites on line indicate where you can purchase grass-fed meat. Several sites include the following: www.lacensebeef.com; www.grassfedtraditions.com. This last site offers

beef, bison, chicken, turkey, butter and cheese and grass-fed pet food items available for the most concerned consumers.

These foods are more expensive than the usual supermarket fare, so if cost is a concern, beware. Some supermarkets offer grass-fed products so ask your meat manager about the cost and availability of these foods.

Did You Know . . . — Donna Gorrell

... that you can disable annoying context menu javascripts? These are the scripts that prevent you from using a right-click menu. In Firefox, click on Tools in the Menu, then choose Options. Highlight the Content tab at the top. Then find the Advanced button on the right side, opposite Enable Java Script. It should be the third one down. From this dialog box you can uncheck the option for "Disable or replace context menus". Now your context menu will work on the web page. You can also prevent websites from resizing your browser window if you uncheck "Move or resize existing windows". And, this is where you can check to block pop ups. That's the first item in the Content tab. It should be checked. Note: By disabling this setting you may prevent customized context menus from working on sites like Google Docs.

... that scanning photos can take a lot of time? Instead of scanning each photo individually, lay as many photos on the scanner glass as can fit. You can then make one scan and print out the page and cut each photo. Or you can lay out the photos and crop each photo by using the tool on your scanner. I crop around each photo and then save that portion [one photo] as a file. Then go on to the next photo and repeat. Less wear and tear on the scanner and you don't have to fiddle with individual photos each time.

... that there are some terms that you should know in order to be a competent computer user? A Dialog box is a pop up box that gives you information or options. A Context menu is what provides you with choices when you right-click on something. A Dropdown list is just that—a list that drops down with a list of options. The Taskbar is the small area at the bottom of your desktop which includes the Start button. The System Tray is that part of the taskbar that is located at the right side. It displays the clock, volume icon, and depending on your system, a host of icons that show what utilities are running. The Quick Launch toolbar is between the Start button and the area that shows what programs are active. This is where you can place icons for quick access to your favorite programs. This is not part of the Taskbar, you must right-click the taskbar and choose QuickLaunch toolbar to activate it.

Soon after Beverly gave us her wonderfully informed talk on all things Google, *The New York Times* devoted a number of pages evaluating Google's newest enterprise, Google Voice. Apparently, it is destined to be a real challenge (and threat) to lots of existing telecommunications systems.

Google Voice is an update of GrandCentral, a free service that offers many goodies, but in the main helps you manage more than one phone number. Let's say you've got a home number, a business number, a cell number, a private number, etc. Google Voice offers a single number and when somebody calls that number all your other numbers ring, all at the same time. Your voice mail messages land in a single voice mail box (on the Web). There's voice mail

transcriptions, which means that recordings are converted into typed text. The *Times* reports that "You can search, sort, save, forward, copy and paste voice mail messages." Not all is well,

however. Apparently, Google's software-based transcriptions are rarely perfect. Punctuation, for instance, is lousy, and there are errors in transcriptions of cell phone conversations.

Google Voice offers many other interesting services. It seems that not all of your phones need to go off at the same time; you can specify which phones would ring when certain people called. Hmmm. I'm sure we will all hear more about Google Voice in the very near future.

Also in the news, *PC World* reports that buyers of used PCs are buying computers loaded with Windows XP. Purchasers of these used PCs say that their older copies of applications typically don't run properly on newer Vista-based PCs.

Keeping up with the news, your club will be auctioning the club's old PC **loaded with Windows XP** at our next meeting. Other goodies will be auctioned too. Along with our regular program it's going to be a great **green** evening.
