Word Processing Tips

WORD — Using Captions with Pictures

If you're composing a newsletter, or some other type of document that involves pictures, you can get to add captions to them.

Suppose you'd like to just identify some pictures as Figure 1 through Figure X.

- * Right-click the graphic object and choose Caption.
- * When the Caption dialog box opens, accept the default settings and click OK.
- * Word will insert 'Figure 1' below the picture.
- * Right-click the next picture and choose Caption, then click OK.
- * Word will insert 'Figure 2' below the picture.
- * Continue until you have captions for all graphics.

Very likely you'd like to be more specific than just numbering the pictures. To identify your pictures more specifically, do this:

- * Right click on a picture
- * Click Caption
- * Click New Label button
- * Type in label title
- * Your label may have a number after the title. This can be deleted when you return to your picture.
- * Click OK and modify the caption to your needs.

WORDPERFECT — Another way to display Reveal Codes (8/9/10/11)

One of WordPerfect's most useful features is its Reveal Codes. These codes let you know exactly what's happening in your documents. To display them, you probably press [Alt][F3] or select View | Reveal Codes from the menu bar.

But if you find yourself frequently opening and closing the code viewing area, try using this shortcut:

- * You'll notice a small rectangle at the very bottom of WordPerfect's vertical scroll bar.
- * Click and drag this bar up and you'll notice a horizontal line across your WordPerfect document.
- * Use the bar to size and display the Reveal Codes window.
- * In versions 9, 10 and 11, you can also click on the bar to open the Reveal Codes window.
- * When finished working with Reveal Codes and you want to close the window, just drag the sizing bar all the way to the top or bottom of your document.

WORD — Dress up your documents with artistic page borders (9/7/2000/2001/2002)

Why use expensive stationery to create attractive documents when you can apply artistic page borders at a fraction of the cost? Word offers a rich set of themed page borders you can easily apply and print with special items like letters, flyers, invitations, greeting cards, and announcements. You can see an example of this tip in the Word attachment to this email. To open the attachment, just double click on Border example.doc in the header above. It's very easy to create a border, very fast, and very effective!

- * To apply an artistic page border (or just a plain border) choose Format | Borders And Shading from the menu bar
- * Then click on the Page Border tab in the Borders And Shading dialog box.
- * Choose the type of border you'd like to apply from the Art dropdown list and adjust the Width setting as desired. You can apply and remove your artistic border from any side of the page using the buttons in the Preview panel.
- * When you've finished, choose the portion of your document to which you'd like the border applied to from the Apply To drop-down list
- * Then click OK. When you do, the border you selected is applied around the edges of the page.

WORDPERFECT — Insert symbols faster with the QuickCharacters feature (9/10/11)

If you use words with accented letters or need to insert a trademark symbol, you probably open the Symbols dialog box by choosing Insert | Symbol from the menu bar. Then you hunt in different categories for the symbol you need and insert it. If you frequently use the same symbols, here's a quicker way.

- * The QuickCharacters feature saves up to 16 of the most recently used symbols in the Symbols button on the Property bar.
- * After you've inserted the symbol once, you can insert it again by clicking on the Symbols button and selecting the symbol from the dropdown menu. You don't need to remember its number (for example: 5, 118 = ~).
- * If the symbol you need isn't listed, click the More button in the dropdown menu to open the Symbols dialog box. ❖

Did You Know . . . — Donna Gorrell

. . . that you could change a lengthy—sometimes two lines long—URL into a tiny URL of less than one line? When you send someone a URL from a website, it might be more than one line long and that confuses some browsers, especially AOL. When we give you URLs in the newsletter some of them wrap into the second line of the columns. Now we’ve found a way to condense the lengthy characters and you can use the same method.

. . . Tiny URL.com is a free service which will convert a long URL into a short one. Go to <http://tinyurl.com> and enter the long URL you’d like converted. A few seconds later a short URL will appear. You can then copy and paste it into a word processor, web page, or email.

* * *

. . . that WindowsXP has a built in feature which will allow you to see text on an LCD screen more clearly? By default it is disabled, but it is possible for you to turn it on by going to the Microsoft site at:

This tip incorporates the tiny URLs that were changed using the first tip. Check it out for yourself.

. . . that the small area at the bottom of your desktop containing the START button is known as the Taskbar? This bar contains not only the start button which explodes into the program list, but it also holds a myriad of other items. The following items list many of the options that are available for the Taskbar.

* * *

On the right side of the Taskbar is an area showing the current time. You can see it digitally or not at all if you choose to hide the clock. Hover over the time and a pop-up window will show you the date. You can also set your clock by right-clicking on the area and

choosing Adjust date + time. To the left of the clock is an area know as the Systray. Here is where you will find icons for what is running when you boot up your computer. Mine shows the Sound icon, Norton’s icon, Mouse Icon, Task Scheduler and my USP software. To change any of the items, I can go to Start | Run and then enter MSCONFIG in the dialog box. Click on the StartUp tab and then go through the list and uncheck those items you do not need. Be careful not to eliminate the necessary items to run your computer.

* * *

I do not use QuickLaunch, but my husband does. To access this, right-click the Taskbar and choose QuickLaunch. You can drag any programs you want to this area which will appear just to the right of the start button. These programs are available to you with one click of the mouse and there is no need to have an icon on your desktop.

* * *

The rest of the Taskbar is generally taken up by the programs that are active at the time you are using them. If you have 3 things open at the same time as I do now, you should see a box with the icon and name of what is open. You can click on any one of these to make them the active program. If too many programs are in your Taskbar it will become difficult to see what they are. To help you spread out those items you can double the size of the Taskbar. Simply touch the mouse to the top of the bar and wait until it becomes a double sided arrow. Then you can pull it up and increase its size.

* * *

The Taskbar can be hidden, can be always on top, or can have small icons in the start list [right-click and choose Properties to make those choices]. You can click on the check marks to see a preview of the differences in the small area above the choices. You can also move the Taskbar to a different location. Click and drag it to the top of the screen, or the side. You can always move it if you don’t like the new location. In WindowsXP there is a choice to Lock The Taskbar, and if you cannot move it, check Properties to see if that choice is checked. ❖

Sites to Visit on the 'Net

We are blessed with four-season weather in Central NY. We have June, July, August and winter. It is June and a new season. Summer begins toward the end of the month. Also in June the 2004 election campaigns will begin in earnest. You probably thought that the campaigns have already begun. But you ain't seen nothing yet.

We have already been subjected to TV campaign ads criticizing the president and ads criticizing the presumptive Democratic candidate. If you want to inject some interest during this video barrage, I have several web sites for your consideration. The first one is www.opensecrets.org. This site provides a comprehensive database for political financial information: in other words, the amount of contributions all candidates receive and the sources of the contributions. Click on the site, and the homepage brings up a menu of choices that scale down the left side of the screen. Additional tabs are found at the top of the page. You can choose top contributions, all contributions, top recipients, presidential race by metro area, and so on.

The Center for Responsive Politics, in Washington, D.C. sponsors this site. As a non-partisan, non-profit research group, the Center for Responsive Politics tracks money in politics and its effect on elections. The purpose of the research effort is to create a more educated voter and an involved citizenry.

Tip O'Neal once remarked that all politics is local, so here is the skinny on our national politicians: Hillary Clinton, Chuck Schumer and Sherry Boehlert. Major contributors to Boehlert include labor unions such as the Carpenters and Joiners, AFL-CIO, National Air Traffic Controllers, and so on. If you wish to learn the amounts, go to the web page.

Schumer's top contributors include many stock brokerage firms and investment houses such as Goldman Sacks, Citigroup, Morgan Stanley, and Bear Sterns. Hillary Clinton's top contributors include: Met Life, Disney, Time Warner, Viacom, and General Electric. Do any of these contributors buy influence? The politicians say no, but you'll have to look at their voting records on specific issues to make your own assessment.

If you want to see what campaigns your friends and neighbors have contributed to, go to www.fundrace.org. The homepage includes a banner headline that reads, "Campaign 2004, Neighbor Search" and includes pictures of John Kerry and President Bush driving sports cars down a highway. Click on neighbor search, type in your zip code and a list of individuals living in your area appears. The list is alphabetically arranged and lists your neighbors and their addresses, the candidate they supported and the amount of

the donation up to a maximum contribution of \$2000, the federal limit. Before you get all riled up and start fuming about an invasion of privacy, this information is on file in the Federal Election Commission's (FEC) database and is a public record. If you're nosy, enjoy a peek at your neighbors' politics.

The next site is a site designed for investigative reporters and journalists in general. www.campaignfinance.org is the URL for the Campaign Finance Center. The campaign finance site is linked to the Investigative Reporters and Editors web site which is part of the University of Missouri School of Journalism, which sponsors this site to "help journalists follow the campaign money trail—on the national, state and local levels." Training seminars presented by the university provide attendees with the keys to "the nuances of campaign finances, and its influence on contracts, jobs and legislation." The Campaign Finance Information Center homepage provides links to many useful databases: a federal contracts database that lists federal contracts awarded to a particular business, and a power search that tracks political cash flow across several states.

The power search enables reporters to find lists of contributions to specific candidates and how the candidates spent the money. According to the site, this link also provides information on money flow to and from PACs (political action committees), candidates, and party committees.

A link to "Current Story" has a report compiled by the Center for Public Integrity that analyzed contribution and expenditure data reported to state agencies in all 50 states. When you click on this link, you find a map of the US. Click on NY and up pops Governor, Lt. Governor, Attorney General, member of Assembly, legislative state member, state senator, Supreme Court justice, contributions and expenditures. All this information resides in the NY State Board of Elections database. Information for the 2002 Annual Report on election campaigns is available for download if you have Adobe Reader. The report totals 33 pages so you might wish to save it to your hard drive and print out individual pages as necessary.

Political Action Committees (sometimes called cash cows) funnel soft money to candidates by sponsoring issue ads. Every industry, trade group and interest group in the country supports at least one PAC. If you type in "political action committees" in Google, you get a list of 1,300,000 web sites to choose from. Click on the link to Yahoo Directory of Political Action Committees and up comes a list that includes: Animal Legislative Action Network, Black America's Political Action Committee, Godless Americans Political Action Committee and the Vietnamese Political Action Committee among many, many others.

So, if you want to try your luck at becoming the next Woodward or Bernstein, have at it. Good luck!
