Bill Gorrell’s Treasurers Report of 9 membership renewals, \$5.00 in extra door prize tickets and a net income of \$143.29 for the month of May was accepted.

General questions from the floor were addressed; among the topics discussed included Thumb Drive operation, PC turn-on problems, hard drive substitutions, and Internet connection difficulties.

PROGRAM

Joe, Chris and Seth from Best Buy entertainingly exposed the mysteries of Tablets, which seem to be the gadget of choice at present. Discussion centered on defining various Tablets available and their unique features and applications. With the plethora of Tablet options on the market, the consumer needs to decide 1) What it’s use will be, 2) How much memory is needed, 3) Connectivity options, 4) Convenience (i.e. how it performs with your other devices) and 5) Size.

The presentation was followed by an interactive Q & A period that covered issues from the ability to read the display in daylight when screens are back lighted and are hard to read to battery life. Tablets at present are much better at consumption than productivity, such as doing taxes or making calculations. The industry trend is to make them more productive.

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Sites to Visit on the 'Net

Remember Ewell Gibbons?

Do you remember Ewell Gibbons encouraging you to eat nuts and twigs you harvested yourself? The 1960s and 1970s “live-off-the-land” guru’s foraging for food idea continues with a new spokesperson. A visit to www.foragingfoodie.weebly.com takes you to the website of Bibi Brion, a Netherlands native now living and foraging in Northern Pennsylvania.

The site offers training tours and workshops for those interested in eating unusual plants, recipes using these plants and a picture gallery featuring the plants and the resulting food. The site contains a calendar listing available edible plants by month. April, for example, contains Dandelion fettucine and Dandelion root tea. May brings brown rice with cattail and Chicory soup.

The most interesting recipe was the Red Current sorbet. For this yummy-sounding treat all you need is 2 cups of berries, 1 cup of water, ½ cup of sugar and ½ teaspoon of corn starch. For more directions, visit the website. Enjoy.

The Future is Here

A news factoid in *Baseline Magazine* [www.Baselinemag.com], features a report about research conducted jointly by Brown University, the Providence VA Medical Center and Massachusetts General Hospital. The joint research team developed a device that can translate brain signals into commands for electronic devices. The implanted device, called Braingate, allows people who have lost the use of their arms and legs to control a computer.

One test subject who suffers from tetraplegia, the inability to use her limbs and the inability to talk, to control a cursor with a 90% accuracy rate. [I wish I could achieve a 90% accuracy level.] For more information visit <http://news.brown.edu/pressreleases/2011/03/braingate>.

The research also appears in *Journal of Neural Engineering*. This is not the first article about this neural device. A visit to Google brings up a plethora of hits that discuss this breakthrough. While this electronic connection continues in development, the article does give hope to severely handicapped individuals that they need not live imprisoned in a body that won't work the way it's supposed to.

Food Trails for Everyone

For people lucky enough to live near the Saranac Brewery in Utica and Brewery Ommegang in Cooperstown, there may be little incentive to find additional artisanal brews. For the adventurous beer buff, however, a short drive west reveals the newly created Finger Lakes Beer Trail.

A click on www.fingerlakesbeertrail.com provides an interactive map identifying 21 microbreweries and brew pubs located in the Finger Lakes and the Rochester area. Starting with Empire Brewing Co. in Syracuse, the trail wends its way through the Finger Lakes to the Rohrbach Brewing Co and Restaurant in Rochester with nineteen additional stops in between. Run the cursor over a map button and the name, address, telephone number and Internet website of that brewery appears.

The brewery I am most familiar with is the Keuka Brewing Company between Hammondsport and Branchport on the West side of Keuka Lake. The White Cap Wheat beer they produce is a Belgium style blend of wheat and barley and lightly hopped. Like Finger Lakes Reislings, this beer goes well with anything.

All the breweries and wineries in the Finger Lakes are friendly and welcome the opportunity to show you their products. Bottoms Up.

America's Most Wanted

For those interested, a visit to www.fbi.gov/wanted/top10 will give you the most actively sought criminals. This list too contains outdated information. Maybe the government cutbacks have caused the FBI to eliminate timely updates.

. . . that you can change the way Windows 7 combines things on the taskbar? If you find it harder to keep track of what's running and would like to go back to the "cluttered look" right-click the Taskbar, select Properties from the context Menu, then choose the Taskbar Tab. In the Taskbar Buttons drop-down menu, select Never Combine and click the OK button.

. . . that you could restore Firefox 4's 'Missing' Orange Button? This orange button [located in the upper left corner] takes the place of the Menu bar. If it is missing, here's how to get it to show up. Start Firefox, then Click View, Toolbars, Menu Bar. The orange button now should appear and the menu bar disappears. What if you don't want the orange button, but would rather have the menu bar? Click on the Options sub-menu and you'll find it there. The orange button eliminates a row of menus giving more viewing space in the browser window. You can switch back and forth between the two views.

. . . that you could control the automatic windows resizing in Windows7? Some people may like the way Windows7 lets you drag a window to the side or top and resize to fill half the screen. But what if you are one of those that would rather control the size of your windows as in previous versions of Windows? It's easy to do as long as you can find where to do it. Click Start, type *Ease*, then click *Ease of Access Center*. Scroll down and click *Make the mouse easier to use*. Scroll down to and enable the last checkbox in that window: *Prevent windows from being automatically arranged when moved to the edge of the screen*. Click OK. You windows will no longer attach to the edges of the screen or resize themselves when you drag them to various spots.

. . . that you could turn on 'Smooth Scrolling' in Firefox? Start Firefox, select Tools, Options. Click the Advanced icon, then look in the Browsing section. Select the Use smooth scrolling check box, click OK.♦
